

Camp 7th O. C. O. A.
Near Atlanta Georgia
Sept. 15th 1864

Dear Aunt Mary

I again find myself seated for the purpose of writing a few lines to let you know that I and Brothers Wash and George are all well and ~~and~~ I heard from Uncle Will to day he is getting much better and was doing duty he was working in the dispensary, that is filling prescriptions (this is a very nice place and if he gets well and can get a permanent detail there I would be glad for I know it would suit him much better than any thing he could get at Dear Aunt we have once more got in to camp and once more free from the roar of the Canon and the rattle of the Muskets

it appears more like a civilised world
than it did a few days ago. The trains
of Cars come in very regular now
and we get mail very regular now
we get some most every day and
I tell you this is a great joy to us
to hear from those that are near and
dear to us you can pretty well imagⁱⁿ
with what pleasure we receive
tidings from our friends at home
when you think how well you
love to hear from those that are
near and dear to you you say in
your letter that you would like for me
to send Uncle to affect home as soon
as I could. I should of sent them
long ago but had no way of send-
ing them only by mail and I
did not like very well to risk them
that way. and thought I would keep
them till Brother Wash would
go home. It is thought it will
not be many days till they
are relieved from duty and sent
back to Chattanooga to be mustered

out and then he will come
home. The suspenders you
spoke of sending by mail we
received of I had wrote to you and
Brother George kept them as he
had none Uncle Will conclude^{ed}
after I wrote to you that he wou^{ld}
keep his pocket handkerchief
as he had nothing of his the
other things I will send to
you. The pocket ink sand.

Uncle Will thought as you did
he thought Uncle Eli should
have it. Hiram told me to get
it and take care of it, he said
he did not want to lose it as Eli
gave it to him when he left.
Pap will pay you for the
suspenders George kept.

I saw your Brother David on
the thirtieth of last month he was
well and hearty then.

Will Aunt as there is no news
of I will close hoping to hear again
from you soon.
